- Warriors who have been medically retired and remain in our community

To serve this last group in particular, Warrior Foundation Freedom Station pioneered a new approach and created Freedom Station – a unique recovery transition center and housing facility that provides injured Warriors with the acclimation time, guidance and resources to successfully make the transition from military service to civilian life.

During this transition, Warriors face heightened risks of homelessness, unemployment, and emotional distress. Since the Freedom Stations opened, the Foundation has:

- Housed 120 active-duty Warriors
- Provided a place for healing, personal growth, and preparation for new opportunities awaiting in civilian life
- Equipped all charming cottages and apartments with furnishings and basic household necessities
- Helped shift Warriors from a "barracks mentality" to independent living

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
